Month of the Poor Souls

November is dedicated to the Souls in Purgatory. To the faithful who in the month of November assist the Souls in Purgatory with prayers or other pious exercises the following indulgences are granted: an indulgence of three years once each day of the month; a plenary indulgence under the usual conditions if they perform the same work every day for the entire month.

"To the faithful who during the octave of the Commemoration of All Souls visit a cemetery with piety and devotion and say either an oral or mental prayer for the departed a plenary indulgence applicable only to the Souls in Purgatory is granted under the usual conditions; this indulgence may be gained once each day during the octave. On any other day in the year an indulgence of seven years may be gained once a day for the same visit and prayer; the indulgence is applicable only to the Souls in Purgatory." Matters Liturgical

Christ the King

Laicism refuses to recognize the rights of God and His Christ over persons and peoples and organizes the lives of individuals, families and of society itself, as though God did not exist. This laicism ruins society, because in place of the love of God and one's neighbor, it substitutes pride and egoism. It begets jealousy between individuals, hatred between classes and rivalry between nations. The world denies Christ because it ignores His royal prerogatives. It must be instructed on this subject. Now "a yearly feast can attain this end, more effectively than the weightiest documents issued by ecclesiastical authority." The Feast of Christ the King is a public, social, and official declaration of the royal rights of

Jesus, as god the Creator, as The Word Incarnate, and as Redeemer. This feast makes these rights to be known and recognized, in a way most suitable to man and to society by the sublimest acts of religion-particularly by Holy Mass. In fact, the end of the Holy Sacrifice is the acknowledgment of God's complete dominion over us, and our complete dependence on Him.

Pentecost XXI

"It is quite true," says St. Augustine, "that every man has his fellow man for a debtor; for who is the man that has had no one to offend him? But, at the same time, who is the man that is not debtor to God? For all of us have sinned. Man, therefore, is both debtor to God, and creditor to his fellow man. It is for this reason that God has laid down this rule for thy conduct, that thou must treat thy debtor, as He treats His.... We pray every day, every day we send up the same petition to the divine throne, every day we prostrate ourselves before God, and say to Him: "Forgive us our debts, as we forgive them that are debtors to us." Do thou, therefore, forgive thy debtor, for it is the rule laid upon thee, it is the condition accepted by thee."

Dress Code

Welcome! Out of respect for the True Presence of Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament, and for the edification of our neighbor, we kindly request that all who come to our parish observe the basic traditional Catholic standards of dress for church attendance:

- Women and girls must cover their heads.
- Women and girls must wear dresses or skirts that cover the knee completely when standing or sitting. Slacks, shorts, sleeveless, tight or low-cut clothing, and dresses or skirts with long slits above the knees are not permitted.
- It is recommended for men and boys to wear suit coats and ties for Sunday Mass. Jeans and other casual attire are inappropriate for attendance at church.
